

Honorable Mayor Carlton and Esteemed City Council;

My name is Phil Scott and I'm the District Manager of West Bay Sanitary District and I wanted to provide you a brief update on the Recycled Water project at Sharon Heights.

In mid-September we completed our Facilities Plan which confirmed the feasibility of a Recycled Water treatment facility at Sharon Heights Golf Course to supply the Sharon Heights area with recycled water for irrigation and industrial users. We also recently received approval of that Facilities Plan from the State Water Resources Control Board which means we are entitled to up to \$75,000 reimbursement from the State toward the expenses of that Facilities Plan. This project has also been recognized in Congressman Jerry McNerney's bill, H.R. 3045, the "California Water Recycling and Drought Relief Act".

We are currently moving ahead with the CEQA Plus work and should be ready to distribute to the public at the end of the month. We are working on our State Revolving Fund (SRF) application to qualify for SRF 1% loans provided for Recycled Water projects through Prop 1.

Prior to Mr. Quirion's departure we had been working with City staff and established an agreed upon pipe alignment along Sand Hill Road and pump station located near the intersection of Sand Hill and Oak Avenue to bring recycled water to the Sharon Heights area including the possibility of a joint trench that contains both the wastewater supply line and communications conduit for the City.

Our Recycled Water Team recently visited the Recycled Water facility at the Corde Valle Country Club in San Martin and we were very pleased to be able to physically witness both the small footprint of the facility and the lack of any detectible odor outside of the facility or even well within the building.

With all that said we have determined that we are ready, willing and able to produce recycled water within our district for the benefit of this community and that, once our project is complete, recycled water will be provided to the Sharon Heights Golf and Country Club and will also be made available to other users nearby by way of an additional distribution pipeline aligned parallel with the supply pipeline along Sand Hill. We have determined that: (1) we can produce a reliable supply of recycled water that is available and is of suitable quality for these uses; (2) at a reasonable cost, considering all relevant factors; (3) that it will not have any negative impacts on public health or safety; and (4) that will not adversely affect any existing water rights, will not degrade water quality, and will not be injurious to plant life, fish, or wildlife.

In summary, the project is moving nicely ahead and we plan to be in design soon and breaking ground in early to mid-2016 and operational and delivering recycled water by mid-2017; thereby, reducing reliability on Hetch Hetchy water for this area.

Ultimately, this is a Public/Private partnership project that will be funded primarily by private enterprise for the greater community benefit of all Menlo Park residents current and future.
